Solutions Voters: A Force in American Politics 2015-2020

Methodology

- The 2020 CSI national survey was conducted in October 2020. This survey is the sixth consecutive Fall survey of registered voters. Five previous CSI surveys similar in content were conducted in the Fall of 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018, and 2019.
- All surveys were based on national cross-sectional samples of 1000 to 1200 registered voters. The 2020 sample interviewed 1260 registered voters.
- Each national sample of registered voters was weighted to match national voter demographic characteristics of gender, race, etc.
- Respondents in each survey completed an extensive on-line questionnaire approximately 20 minutes in length.

Project History

- The Civil Society Institute (CSI) has been conducting surveys on leadership and problem solving since 2004.
- The 2015 though 2020 CSI Leadership Surveys identified a key cohort of voters who are pragmatic and optimistic about solving many of the issues facing America today.
- These voters are labeled "Solution Voters"

Solutions Voters: Basic Definition

The Solutions Voter is a permanent and distinct part of the American electorate defined by the following characteristics...


Believes practical solutions exist for most of our problems Expresses optimism that existing solutions can be successfully implemented Prioritizes solutions over party and ideology Engages politically and is well informed

The strongest predictor of membership in the Solutions Voter cohort is optimism about progress in implementing solutions to our problems

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
Issues Optimism Among 2020 Voters

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2020 Issues Optimism Among Solution Voters





Examples of Common Ground Issues for Republican and Democratic Solutions Voters :

- Protecting our water quality and safety is a very high priority issue.
- Water management and planning systems must be updated and reformed particularly where water is scare.
- Pesticides and chemicals from farming and ranching put our water supply at risk.
- New technology can save us from our aging water systems and keep our water safe.
- Fossil fuels must remain our cornerstone of the energy system because of costs and jobs.
- Transitioning away from fossil fuels such as oil, natural gas and coal, will make our products more expensive / less competitive.



Solution Voters consistently support each of the four common good" statements


Particularly strong support is give to "supporting a strong military" and "paying a premium to support a transition to clean energy

What We Heard in Focus Groups



Voters from the right and the left openly discuss and believe that progress toward workable solutions to our problems are possible but currently out of reach because of the hyper partisan polarization among our politicians



Political party was cited as more negative driver of nation's division than race/ethnicity, region of the country, religion, and gender identity. The media is viewed as a key culprit in exacerbating dysfunctional partisanship.



Participants believe that it is up to "all of us" to work together, listen to each other, and strive to compromise but struggle to operationalize how to do this.





Strategic Implications: We Can Move Beyond Partisan Gridlock





Solutions Voters and their informed optimism are an unrecognized constant force in American politics and embody the political DNA of unique American democratic values and principles. Solutions Voters are primed to move beyond polarized politics because they disrupt the left/right, conservative/liberal images we have of ourselves and our politics.

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Solutions Voters are not bound by political dogma. Therefore, they are more open to embrace solutions that arise from anyplace across the political spectrum.

Strategic Implications: Key to A New Kind of Politics

- Solutions Voters most likely to vote against their preferred party and ideology to give support to the solutions he/she believes in.
- Political candidates who have the ability and courage to cross party dogma to offer the right mix to a solutions voter can hold special appeal to the Solutions Voter.
- Solution Voters are primed to be key to policy breakthroughs on the following issues:
 - Health Care
 - Immigration
 - Criminal justice



- Solutions Voters are diverse and exist across race, age, and gender.
- What unites them includes:
 - a future-oriented optimism that despite different view, we can unite together and solve our problems
 - a personal engagement with current issues
 - a trusting nature
 - a belief in Americans' goodness
 - a concern for the role of government
